3. **Parental and Community Engagement:** Implement awareness campaigns to educate parents and community members about the critical role of early childhood development. This includes providing practical guidance on supporting children's growth at home and fostering a community culture that values early education.
4. **Governmental and Policy Advocacy:** Collaborate with government officials and policymakers to integrate ECD into national education strategies. Advocacy should prioritize securing funding, institutionalizing ECD programs, and aligning them with broader development goals.
5. **Monitoring and Evaluation:** Develop robust mechanisms for tracking the impact of ECD programs and workshops. Regular assessment will ensure accountability and provide insights for continuous improvement.

By implementing these recommendations, Afghanistan can lay a comprehensive groundwork for transforming its education system, starting with the youngest and most vulnerable members of society.
